



Thermal Imaging Cameras: Next Steps

In the Forest of Dean, energy consumption in our homes accounts for 28% of the districts greenhouse gas emissions **(1)**. Forest Community Energy wants to tackle the climate emergency through supporting people to generate and use energy differently in the Forest of Dean.

Small gaps

For heat loss around doors, windows, letterboxes, cables or plumbing fixtures, there are lots of low-cost ideas to fix problem spots on the Centre for Sustainable Energy website at **www.cse.org.uk/advice/diy-draught-proofing**.

Larger areas

If your thermal camera photos show there are larger areas where heat is escaping your home, there are lots of options to help you fix the problem.

Roof

Walls

If your home is single glazed, secondary glazing will reduce energy loss. If double glazing is not an option for your property, it is usually still possible to fit alternative secondary glazing.
